HOLY GOSPEL *Luke 15:1-10*

¹ Now the tax collectors and sinners were all drawing near to hear him. ² And the Pharisees and the scribes grumbled, saying, "This man receives sinners and eats with them." ³ So he told them this parable: ⁴ "What man of you, having a hundred sheep, if he has lost one of them, does not leave the ninety-nine in the open country, and go after the one that is lost, until he finds it? ⁵ And when he has found it, he lays it on his shoulders, rejoicing. ⁶ And when he comes home, he calls together his friends and his neighbors, saying to them, 'Rejoice with me, for I have found my sheep that was lost.' ⁷ Just so, I tell you, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who need no repentance. ⁸ "Or what woman, having ten silver coins, if she loses one coin, does not light a lamp and sweep the house and seek diligently until she finds it? ⁹ And when she has found it, she calls together her friends and neighbors, saying, 'Rejoice with me, for I have found the coin that I had lost.' ¹⁰ Just so, I tell you, there is joy before the angels of God over one sinner who repents." SERMON HYMN LSB 609 "Jesus Sinners Doth Receive"

SERMON

The theme of the three Scripture readings for today is about our Lord's desire for us to have his forgiveness. This is not something new, it is what God has desired for us poor sinners since our first parents fell into sin after being tempted by the devil in the Garden of Eden at the beginning of time. There, the Lord promised to send the Seed of the woman to crush the head of that evil serpent. The grace and mercy of God has been seen in the way he has dealt with us sinful people throughout history. He continually restrained his wrath against the sin and defilement of the ancient Israelites, even instituting the divine service to daily cleanse them of their ritual impurities. Through the prophets, he promised to forgive iniquity and to remember sins no more. And in the Old Testament reading for today, the prophet Micah says, "Who is a God like you, pardoning iniquity and passing over transgression for the remnant of his inheritance? He does not retain his anger forever, because he delights in steadfast love. He will again have compassion on us; he will tread our iniquities underfoot. You will cast all our sins

into the depths of the sea." The Lord is compassionate, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love ... as the Scripture says elsewhere. Still, all of the rutual purifications, the prophesies of the remission of sins, and the way that God dealt mercifully with his Old Testament people was based on what would happen in the future. It was rooted in the fact that the promised Seed of the woman, the Seed of Abraham, and the Seed of David would come one day to make atonement, make the payment that God requires for sin, by his death on the cross.

The promised Messiah, the Christ, has come and has made the payment for all of your sins, all of my sins, and the sins of all people. The death of Christ and his resurrection from the dead is the basis and reason for God's willingness to forgive us, absolve us, and remit our sins. Christ made the payment for us! Now, we have forgiveness through repentance and faith in him. As Jesus says in the Gospel reading, "there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who need no repentance." Again he says, "there is joy before the angels of God over one sinner who repents." Christ made the payment that we owed to God for our sins; and we receive the forgiveness and eternal life that Christ won for us through repentance and faith. In the Lutheran Christian tradition, we define repentance chiefly as contrition and faith, being terrified by our sins then looking to Christ for relief from our terror. In the Old Testament, repentance means to turn around and walk in the opposite direction. In the New Testament, repentance has to do with a change of mind, which then directs our lives toward God in both faith and love. I think repentance involves all of these. The point, though, is that God desires to forgive us. And he has made his forgiveness available to us by the death and resurrection of Christ and by our repentance and faith in him.

But our repentance and faith are not something that is mustered up within us by our own strength or merits. Rather, the Holy Spirit works within us through the Word, Baptism, Absolution, and Communion to both bring us to repentance and faith in Christ and to keep us repentant and in Christ. That is why it is necessary for us to come to the divine service to receive the Gospel and Sacraments, for through these gifts that our Lord Jesus himself instituted for us, we receive the Holy Spirit again and again throughout our entire lives to keep us repentant and in our forgiveness in Christ. As helpful as family devotions are during times when we cannot come to church, they still do not take the place of the divine service. We want people to be healthy and safe, physically. More importantly, however, is being safe and saved from our sins and healthy, Spiritually. The Holy Spirit comes to us through the Word of God, just as he comes to us through the ongoing effects of our Baptism. He also comes to us for our repentance and faith through Holy Absolution and the Holy Body and Blood of Christ, which are only received in the divine service. I implore you and encourage you to come to the divine service to receive the Holy Spirit and the salvation and forgiveness that he gives to you in all of his holy gifts. Furthermore, the Word and Sacraments not only bring forgiveness, but they offer God's grace in specific ways and unique purposes. I like to think of the distinctions this way in part: the Word is our invitation to come to our Lord's Banquet; Baptism and Absolution wash and clothe us with the proper attire; and Holy Communion is the Feast itself. In each of these distinct ways, the Holy Spirit gives us unique gifts that Christ instituted for us and our salvation. Through all of these, the Father has made and keeps you his royal sons and daughters to celebrate in his presence now by faith and forever in the glory of heaven. Amen!
